FIRST READING

From the letter of the apostle Paul to the Romans 6:3-18

If we have died with Christ, we believe that we are also to live with him

Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life.

For if we have grown into union with him through a death like his, we shall also be united with him in the resurrection. We know that our old self was crucified with him, so that our sinful

body might be done away with, that we might no longer be in slavery to sin. For a dead person has been absolved from sin. if' then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him. As to his death, he died to sin once and for all; as to his life, he lives for God. Consequently, you too must think of yourselves as [being] dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus.

Therefore, sin must not reign over your mortal bodies so that you obey their desires. And do not present the parts of your bodies to sin as weapons for wickedness, but present yourselves to God as raised from the dead to life and the parts of your bodies to God as weapons for righteousness. For sin is not to have any power over you, since you are not under the law but under grace.

What then? Shall we sin because we are not under the law but under grace? Of course not! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to someone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that, although you were once slaves of sin, you have become obedient from the heart to the pattern of teaching to which you were entrusted. Freed from sin, you have become slaves of righteousness.

SECOND READING

Choose one of the following readings.

From a Treatise on Death by Saint Cyprian, bishop and martyr (N. 21-22, 26; CSEL 3, p. 310-311, 313-314)

We know that our departed brothers and sisters have gone on before us

I am the resurrection: whoever believes in me, though be should die, will come to life,. and whoever is alive and believes in me will never die. If we believe in Christ let us have faith in his words and promises, that we who are not to die forever may come in joyful security to Christ with whom we are to conquer and reign for eternity.

In the meanwhile we die: we pass by death to immortality, eternal life cannot succeed unless it has befallen us to depart from here. This is not an end, but a passage and, the journey of time being traversed, a crossing over to eternity. Would we not hasten to better things? Who would not pray to be more quickly changed and formed to the image of Christ and to the dignity of heavenly grace? The apostle Paul declares: *Our citizenship is in heaven: from there also we look for the Lord, Jesus Christ, who will give a new form to this lowly body of ours and remake it like that body of his glory.* Christ the Lord also promises that we shall be such, since he prays to his Father that we may be with him and may rejoice with him in the heavenly kingdom saying: *Father, I will that where I am they also whom you have given me may be with me and may see my glory which you gave me before the world was made.* He who is to come to the abode of Christ, to the glory of the heavenly kingdom, ought not to grieve and mourn but rather, in accordance with the promise of the Lord, in accordance with faith in the truth, to rejoice in this his departure and translation.

We ought never to forget, beloved, that we have renounced the world. We are living here now as aliens and only for a time. When the day of our homecoming puts an end to our exile, frees us from the bonds of the world and restores us to paradise and to a kingdom, we should welcome it. What person, stationed in a foreign land, would not want to return home as soon as possible? Well, we look upon paradise as our home, and a great crowd of our loved ones awaits us there; a countless throng of parents, brothers, sisters and children longs for us to join them. Assured though they are of their own salvation, they are still concerned about ours. What joy both for them and for us to see one another and embrace! O, the delight of that heavenly kingdom where there is no fear of death! O, the supreme and endless bliss of everlasting life!

There is the glorious band of apostles; there, the exultant assembly of prophets; there, the innumerable host of martyrs crowned for their glorious victory in combat and death. There, in triumph, are the virgins who subdued their passions by the strength of continence. There, the merciful are rewarded, those who fulfilled the demands of justice by providing for the poor. In obedience to the Lord's command they turned their earthly patrimony into heavenly treasure.

My dear brothers and sisters let all our longing be to join them as soon as we may. May God see our desire, may Christ see this resolve that springs from faith, for he will give the rewards of his love more abundantly to those who have longed for him more fervently.

From the Ritual of the Order of Servants of Mary for the Remembrance of Deceased Brothers and Sisters

(Rome, 1975, p. 7-9)

Prayer for the deceased flows from the faith and communion of the Servants

The event of death calls attention to the very meaning of our existence: as a journey does not end in a dark void, but in the luminous fullness of him who is our life; as a serious risk, even if its outcome is not uncertain for the person who believes in him who is our security and our peace; as a fruitful seed which, while corrupting in temporal death, is destined to produce the copious abundance of eternal life. Numerous passages of Sacred Scripture support our faith reminding us of our final destiny, our supernal hopes, the life which awaits us when the last enemy -death- will be wiped away and *God will be all in all*. Those who freely choose to follow Christ, he wonderfully associates with himself in his glorious destiny: *Whoever would be in my personal service must follow me; and then, wherever I am, there too, my servant will be. Whoever is in my personal service will be honoured by my Father. O Father! I will that those whom you have entrusted to me shall be at my side where I am: I want them to behold my glory.* There is one Common destiny for Head and members; in fact, *if we have died with him we shall also live with him.*

To us Servants of the Virgin Mary, whom an ancient family custom invites to place our interior gaze frequently upon the mystery of the cross, it will not be difficult to discern in the fact of death an event of life: there, the Servant of the Lord performs his supreme service to God his Father, and to people, his friends; there, the Handmaid of the Lord, at the foot of the cross of her dying son, is the servant of life and Mother of the living; there, the wisdom of God, confounding the best laid plans of humans, transforms loss into gain, the drops of water and blood, witness of a death that has already come, into a powerful and irresistible river of life.

Death inflicts a wound upon the local community, the province and the whole Order. A presence ceases: *Man's days are like grass; be blossoms like the flowers of the field: a wind passes over them and they cease to be.* His work and commitment to serve fall to another. His voice is no longer heard in common prayer. His witness is no longer there to see. His place at table remains empty and there is one less voice to be heard as we converse with one another. AE of this is painful, to be sure, yet this absence which is felt by all does not interrupt our fraternity. It continues even

though in a different way. In fact, it spreads and is strengthened within the Mystical Body of Christ. Our dialogue continues, our friendship endures, our love grows in anticipation of that day when our entire family will gather in our Father's house and the threads that seemed to be broken will meet to form a garment nothing can tear or consume. Our deceased brothers and sisters, clothed in the purifying mercy of God and the prayers of the Church, become citizens of the eternal Jerusalem and share in the banquet of the kingdom. In each of them we have a special friend and intercessor who is concerned about us who are still pilgrims here on earth.

Our suffrages spring from our common faith and our religious communion. Our Order has always been particularly careful in carrying out this act of imploration and friendship. The most ancient Servite legislation – the *Constitutiones antiquae* - dedicate Chapter V to suffrages for the deceased of the Order. And there is reason for pleasant surprise when we note in this ancient legislation both the abundance of suffrages prescribed, and the breadth of love which these suffrages express. They are not limited to members of the Order, but with affection and appreciation are prescribed for our parents and benefactors as well.

Jesus died to gather into one all the dispersed children of God (John 11:51-52).

Praise the Lord for he is good; sing to our God for he is loving: to him our praise is due. The Lord builds up Jerusalem and brings back Israel's exiles, he heals the broken-hearted, he binds up all their wounds. He fixes the number of the stars; he calls each one by its name.

Lord our God, you look with love on all that lives. You heal the broken-hearted and bind up their wounds. Remember the bond of love that unites us with our brothers and sisters who have been called from this life. Grant that we may share their company for ever in the fullness of life in Christ.
